Suggestions for Improvement:	Your art lesson on 'snowy trees' was definitely a keeper. The tie-in between the students' blizzard days and a snowy art project was perfect. Crystal clear directions are so important, especially when doing an art project that contains paint. Painting with students is not an easy task, and many teachers shy away from the mess, but it was pleasant to see how organized you were with the paints and all of the equipment needed. When finished with their art project, you did a very quiet transition into a math project; never wasting a moment of valuable teaching time.

As you walked the classroom, you were so complimentary to the students, and it wasn't an overall: that's nice. Presence of body, at times, is more powerful than any words Your continual movement around the classroom during the whole lesson was a great way to keep classroom management under control.
